Voir Dire (pp. 167-172)."

PROSPECTIVE JUROR: 0374.

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THE COURT: Sir, I'm going to review your answers with

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you. You responded yes to questions 10, 15, 27 and 32.

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We're just going to review your responses and provide

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you with an opportunity to explain why you said yes. All

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right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Sure.

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THE COURT: Question 10, just to remind you, is the

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question that asked whether or not you or any member of your

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family or close friend ever studied law or been employed by a

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lawyer or law firm, worked in the courthouse or worked as a

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paralegal or legal secretary or performed legal investigative

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work.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes. I'm an attorney.

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THE COURT: Okay. What kind of attorney are you?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: I am essentially a civil

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litigator.

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THE COURT: So no criminal work?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Very little criminal work. I

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would say it's 95 percent civil, maybe 5 percent criminal

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adjacent.

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THE COURT: Okay. That 5 percent that's criminal

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adjacent, what -- what kind of work is that?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: So for example, one matter that I

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work on is -- involves -- it's a sealed matter, but it involves

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a grand jury subpoena and an order under the Stored

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Communications Act of nondisclosure.

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THE COURT: Other than that, any other criminal

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matters you're working on?
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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: No.
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THE COURT: Just generally, what kind of civil
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litigation do you do?
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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: So I do what we call government
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and regulatory litigation. So that is typically Administrative
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Procedure Act challenges to agency rules. I represent a number
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of universities and school boards in a wide range of
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litigation, and I also represent some tech companies in a range
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of litigation.

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THE COURT: Do you work at a firm?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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THE COURT: Anything about your work that would make
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it difficult for you to be a fair and impartial juror in this
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case?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Not -- no, not difficult to be a
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fair and impartial juror in this case. The one thing is that
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the one sealed matter, you know, involves this U.S. Attorney's
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Office and the U.S. Attorney of DC office.

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THE COURT: Okay. Well, I don't want you to -- I
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mean, it's a sealed matter.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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THE COURT: So you have indicated it involves the U.S.

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Attorney's Office and a Stored Communications Act issue. Yes?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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THE COURT: Okay. I take it you're not representing
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the government in that case?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: I am not.

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THE COURT: So you're likely representing, I guess,
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either the -- perhaps the target or ISP?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes. I don't want to say much

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about this case, but.

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THE COURT: Okay. All right. Again, the question is,

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knowing that and your representation in that case, is there

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anything about that that would make it difficult for to you be

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fair and impartial in this case, which also involves the

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government?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR: No.

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THE COURT: Question 15 asks, have you or any member

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of your family or a close friend ever been the subject of a

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criminal investigation, been accused of criminal conduct, been

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arrested or convicted of a crime, been a victim of a crime,

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been a witness to a crime, or testified in court or before a

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grand jury, or been required to appear in court for any reason.

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You answered yes.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes. I've been a victim of a

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crime.

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THE COURT: How long ago was that?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: This was in March 2022, so about a

year and a half ago, a little bit less.

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THE COURT: Okay. Are you able to say what happened,

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just the nature of it? Was it a violent crime?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: I was robbed at gunpoint.

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THE COURT: In DC?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: In DC.

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THE COURT: Was the perpetrator caught?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Not to my knowledge.

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THE COURT: There was no trial, to your knowledge?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: No.

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THE COURT: You never testified in that case?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: No.

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THE COURT: Did you report the crime?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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THE COURT: Is there anything about you being a victim

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of that crime that would impact your ability to be fair and

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impartial in this case?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: No.

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THE COURT: Question 27 asked, do you or any member of
your immediate family or a close friend live or work within a

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few blocks of the Capitol or have any special familiarity with

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the immediate area around the United States Capitol.

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You said yes.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes. I worked for several years

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just south of the Capitol complex.

THE COURT: Whereabouts?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Where did I work?

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THE COURT: Yes, where, the location.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Sure.

THE COURT: They're very concerned about how close you

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were to the Capitol, how well you know the Capitol and the

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Capitol grounds.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Sure. I understand. It was on

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South Capitol Street Southeast. So that would be a few blocks

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south and a block or so west of the Capitol South Metro

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Station.

THE COURT: And how long did you work there?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: I worked there two different

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times, so it would be a total of about two-and-a-half to three
years.

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THE COURT: And when did you stop that job?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: In February of 2017.

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THE COURT: So well before January 6th?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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THE COURT: Finally, question 32 asked whether despite

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what you may have heard or seen about events at the Capitol on

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January 6th and no matter what feelings or opinions you may

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have formed, do you believe you can put that aside and decide

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this case only on the evidence you received in court, follow

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the law that I gave you and decide the case in a fair and

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impartial manner. You answered yes. Is that still correct?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Yes.

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
