Dear Barbara,

Thank you for your letter dated 9/17/24, which arrived shortly before my birthday (which was on 9/27/2024).

Regarding the request that I write a letter to Trump and send it to Marie Goodwyn, I have a letter ready to send but so far I have not sent it.
